Context

- Proposed project: in situ
 decommissioning of Whiteshell Nuclear
 Reactor by Canadian Nuclear
 Laboratory (CNL)
- Sagkeeng First Nation had strong reservations
- Contrasting worldviews and understandings of impacts
- Sagkeeng proposed their own PSIA to analyze community perspectives

Approach Used

- 1. Storywork
- 2. Trauma-Informed Methods
- 3. Discourse Analysis & Identity Mapping



Storywork

The study centred community stories and lived-experience to understand their **collective identity**.

Knowledge was documented through:

01 | Semi-structured Interviews

02 | Psychological Assessments





Trauma-Informed Approach

Trauma awareness shapes:

- How we engage with community members
- How we create cultural and psychological safety
- How we operate as practitioners and look after ourselves / our teams



Mitigation


- Building a Trauma-Informed Decision-Making Model
- 2. Building a Trauma-Informed Engagement Plan
- 3. Building a Long-term Monitoring Program
- 4. Providing capacity and access to independent expertise
- 5. Actively investing in improving the psychological wellbeing of Sagkeeng members





Conclusions & Impact

- Built understanding with the proponent and regulator.
 - Perceived impacts are real impacts.
 - Historical trauma matters.
- Transformed the relationship
- Set legal precedence for leveraging PSIA to build case on historical harms.





Path Forward for Psychosocial IA

- Psychosocial IA allows for deeper, more holistic analysis, with greater community voice.
- Identity-based approaches can create space for reclaiming agency and identity.
- Psychosocial IA requires a trauma-lens to help IA practitioners do no harm and build transformative relationships.
